

## A message from THE BLI BLI COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

This past 3 months have been particularly busy for the Community Association. We have been working with Karen Simpson for some time now using her photos in the Bulletin and so we were keen to be able to repay the favour and enable her to exhibit some of her works. She was joined by 3 artists Cam and Helen Minto and Ursula Kelly on Sunday 19 March and collectively they filled the Hall with displays. It was wonderful that so many people took the opportunity to check out the display and meet the artists. As a result of its success another day is being planned for later in the year.

Following our AGM on 21 March the Community Association facilitated a public consultation evening at the Bli Bli State School Hall in respect to the proposed Bli Bli Northern Village Development. It was an opportunity for people to ask questions and try and find out more about the proposed development. As is well known now the developer has lodged their notice in respect to their application for a material change of use to the planning scheme with public submissions open until 30 June.

As a result of the interest in the development the May monthly meeting of the Community Association attracted quite some attention with Cr Maria Suarez on hand to address the meeting. Our next meeting on Tuesday 20 June is sure to attract more interest and we anticipate that Cr Suarez will also be joined by local state member Dan Purdie MP where traffic is sure to be an agenda item.

Friday 14 April saw the unveiling and dedication of the new cenotaph with a good size crowd gathered for the event. Then the ANZAC Day service at the new cenotaph saw a larger than expected crowd gather for a fitting service being the very first held in Bli Bli. This clearly will be an annual event which will see the 2 local schools working together with the broader community to host a service each year. The plan is to involve some local returned service men and women whom maybe interested in being on a steering committee. If this is of interest, please get in touch with the Community Association.

Finally, the Old Church received a new outside coat which has been in the planning stage for over 12 months. It is great to see the building looking fresh again and hopefully this time the paint will last a little bit longer.

Hopefully the Community Garden area behind the Old Hall will take shape shortly. Some progress has occurred, and we are just waiting on the final stages for the area to be cleared and safe for the raised gardens to be constructed. Once that occurs the interest group will be able to get going to fill the area with gardens and produce which will be a great community meeting space.

The Bli Bli Community Association acknowledges the continued support received from the Sunshine Coast Council by its grants program.




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## An update from your

## LOCAL STATÉ MEMBER, DAN PURDIE MEMBER FOR NINDERRY

Just in case you missed it, a community campaign has been launched to improve pedestrian safety and access in Bli Bli, ahead of the upcoming State Budget.

Locals have been telling me that pedestrian safety is one of their top concerns, and although I've raised the issue with TMR on numerous occasions, we've always been told there's no funding.

An accident earlier this year which saw a school student narrowly avoid serious injury after being hit by a car has reignited the need to address the matter, and we're calling on locals to support the campaign by signing the petition which calls on the State Government to fund safety improvements in the State Budget.

We all know that Bli Bli is one of the fastest growing areas on the Sunshine Coast, and for good reason, but unfortunately, infrastructure hasn't kept pace, and there is a lack of pathways connecting residents with the main shopping and commercial area.

With thousands more families and seniors now calling the area home, there's a real need for better pedestrian facilities. A big thank you to Bli Bli local Natalie Tattam, who was brave enough to share her daughter's story in order to get something done.

The campaign is also being supported by the Bli Bli Community Association, which has long been behind a push for better pedestrian access.

In other road-related infrastructure news, I recently asked the Transport Minister for an update on the \$800,000 in funding that was re-announced earlier this year to start planning upgrades of the Bli Bli bridge.

The Minister confirmed that around \$100,000 of the funding has been spent to date on an assessment of the existing bridge,

including surveying, preliminary assessments and transport modelling, as well as preparing procurement documentation.

Further funding will be allocated to planning activities to determine options for a future bridge upgrade, including an analysis of future transport demands, active transport requirements and social, cultural and environmental considerations.

With the remainder of the \$800,000 funding to be spent in the upcoming financial year, this is a project I will be closely monitoring, and I look forward to providing regular updates as I receive them.

## **BLI BLI CENOTAPH**

The first ANZAC Day ceremony at the new Bli Bli Cenotaph was very special. I felt privileged to play in creating a united place of remembrance for the Bli Bli and Parklakes communities. Sunshine Coast and Regional District RSL Inc. had been working on this since 2015, with the Veterans In Step group an integral part of the process, and thoughtful design by Cam Crossley.

Sunshine Coast and Regional District RSL received an Australian Government Grant for \$110,000 yet this still wasn't enough to complete the project.

Through additional funding sources making Sunshine Coast Council were able to contribute \$59,000 to make this project happen.

Huge thanks to Stephen who managed the project delivery, (and any hiccups along the way), as well as the Parks and Gardens team and Permits team for their work in ensuring all elements were covered and paperwork in order.

Rural landowners can apply for financial help to complete on-ground environment projects on their private property, with Sunshine Coast Council's Landholder Environment Grants now open. Grants of up to \$15,000 are available for projects like bush regeneration; reducing sediment loss on farms; control of environmental weeds; modifying non-boundary fencing to make it wildlife friendly; revegetation of degraded areas; and to establish vegetation corridors and buffer zones. ## **NEW CENOTAPH IN TIME** FOR ANZAC DAY

They told me they wanted it constructed before ANZAC Day, and they did it!

Congratulations to the Bli Bli community - especially the Sunshine Coast & Regional District RSL Sub Branch - on their new cenotaph. It was a pleasure to join local veterans at its unveiling today.

While I helped secure nearly \$110,000 for the cenotaph through the former Coalition Government's Salute Your Service program, it's the local community who did the really hard work and made it happen.

Standing 3.4 metres high, it will be a focal point for Bli Bli residents to commemorate and honour the men and women of our defence force who have served, or continue to serve, in war, conflict and peacekeeping operations.

## CYBER SECURITY HIGHLIGHTED AT THE FAIRFAX SENIORS FORUM

My 2023 Seniors Forum was held recently where we discussed cyber security.

Online safety continues to be a priority issue and it was great to hear from the experts - NBN Australia, IDCARE and CAPA Services.

Preventing scammers from reaching our information was the number one message, and below are the top three points taken from the presentations on the day:

- 1. Pause if you receive unsolicited contact from someone (phone call or email), pause and cease contact to verify what they are saying. Contact the organisation directly using publicly available contact points;
- 2. Never allow anyone remote access to your computer unless YOU have initiated it; and
- 3. Consider using a password manager and multi-factor authorisation apps for added layers of security.

## **NEW LOCAL ROADS**

I am proud to have secured 80% for the \$301 million upgrade of the Maroochydore-Mons Rd Interchange on the Bruce Highway a few years ago.

The project reached two key milestone recently, with the opening of the new eastern and western service roads to traffic at Forest Glen and Chevallum respectively.

The practical benefit of these service roads is that motorists, pedestrians and cyclists no longer have to enter the Bruce Highway for local commutes around this area; getting people home sooner and safer.

If you travel the Bruce regularly, you would also have noticed that the speed limit is again 110 km/hr through Forest Glen/Chevallum

### **COMMUNITY PHARMACIES**

A number of community pharmacies on the Sunshine Coast are under threat due to Labor's new policy on dispensing medicines.

My Coalition colleagues and I have called for the government to guarantee that its new policy will NOT:

- harm the viability of community pharmacies;
- · adversely affect medicine supplies; and
- · increase medicine stockpiling and wastage.

If you're visiting a community pharmacy, please be conscious of the pressure they're under. Some pharmacists are worried about the sustainability of their business model and many staff worry about the future of their jobs.

On Friday 14 April an unveiling and dedication service was held at the location of the new Bli Bli Cenotaph in Honour Avenue Parklakes. The service was open to the general public with various invited dignitaries. A good size crowd gathered for the service to be welcomed by District President of RSL Sunshine Coast and Regional District Mr Ian Hall OAM. The assembled crowd also heard from Ted O'Brien MP and Mayor Mark Jamieson. Both gave some background as to how the Cenotaph came about and the involvement of both the Federal Government and Sunshine Coast Council financially to make it happen. They both spoke about the importance of the Cenotaph and how it can bring a community together.

Following a prayer by Padre Davide Eden and a rendition of the Advance Australia Fair by the Halcyon Choir, the dignitaries collectively cut the ribbon and unwrapped the Cenotaph.

A special mention needs to be made of Cam Crossley a local Sunshine Coast Sculptor who was commissioned to make the Cenotaph. The end product has been very well received by all as a fitting design for the area and credit must go to Cam Crossley. One of the prior owners of the land when it was a sugar cane farm Max Perren was present and said that "my father would be very happy to see where the Cenotaph has been located and what has been achieved."




## PHOTOGRAPHY AND **ART EXHIBITION**

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

# ANZAC DAY

This ANZAC Day saw the inaugural service being held in the Bli Bli area. With a long history back to WW1 of Bli Bli providing soldiers to the Australian Armed Forces, it was fitting that finally a local meeting point has been established to be able to hold such a service.

The Bli Bli service has been established at a time that allows for people to attend dawn services in other areas and then meet at 9am. The organisers were expecting a reasonable crowd, but were thrilled to see the large crowd that did turn out. The sight of people wondering down the hill from their home with their children for the services at the new Cenotaph was exactly what had been hoped in the location of the Cenotaph at the end of Honour Avenue.

The service commenced with a welcome from the District RSL President Mr Ian Hall OAM, followed by a wonderful address to

those gathered by ex Afghanistan soldier and local GP, Dr Glen Mulhall. Glen recounted some stories as well as talking about 3 local soldiers that had served and were heroes for their sacrifices. Both Good Samaritan Catholic College and Bli Bli State School students joined to sing God Bless Australia, 400 seasons and Amazing Grace with the Halcyon Choir giving a rendition of God Defend New Zealand and Advance Australia Fair.

The service at the new Cenotaph was a wonderful way of bringing the wider Bli Bli Community altogether in one location. Planning is already under way for next year with an expectation that the Bli Bli ANZAC Day service will continue to grow.

Acknowledgement must go to the Federal Government and Sunshine Coast Council for the financial contribution they made to the delivery of the Cenotaph.

## YIN AND YANG

### MOST OF US HAVE HEARD OF THE WORDS YIN AND YANG BEFORE.

You know the symbol, half black half white with a little dot of white in the black and a little dot of black in the white. Just think of the old surf brand "Town and Country" or Kung Fu Panda. This symbol represents that everything works best when balanced. When things are in balance harmony prevails. The white on the left represents the Yin and the Black represents the Yang. 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# Is your Pet OVER FIVE YEARS OF AGE?

Pets age much faster than people do, and their rate of aging is dependent on their species as well as their size:

Cats are generally considered senior citizens after the age of 8.

Dogs however, come in a wide variety of weights - the greater their size, the sooner they reach their golden years:

- Tiny dogs (<10kg) are considered seniors once over the age of 8
- Small dogs (10-25kg), over 7
- Medium dogs (25-40kg), over 6
- Large dogs (>40kg), over 5.

Most of us don't need a medical checkup more than once a year. But dogs and cats are different. By age two, most pets have already reached adulthood. At age four, many are entering middle age. And by age seven, many dogs, particularly larger breeds, are considered

For many pet lovers, watching our companions grow older is a comforting, rewarding experience. Hard to believe the same bundle of energy tearing around the yard just a few years ago is now the calm and kind old friend curled at our feet.

As dogs and cats age much faster than we do, health problems progress much more rapidly. Dramatic health changes can occur in a very short amount of time, and as they age, pets can experience the same aches, pains and other health problems associated with ageing that we do. They are at risk for diabetes, arthritis, heart disease, kidney disease and cancer, to name a few. Additionally, as today's pets are living longer, chances are many will experience a potentially serious illness during their lifetime. Just as we give special attention to the needs of puppies, dogs heading into their later years require unique attention to help comfort them and extend their precious time with us.

As your pet ages, you may notice the outward signs: white around the muzzle, less exuberance, hesitation trying to stand up after a nap or difficulty climbing into your vehicle. Then there are the internal signs we can't see, like a slowing metabolism, and changing nutritional

Observe your pet for the EARLY WARNING SIGNS of aging and age-related diseases:

- Change in appetite
- Weight loss or weight gain
- Loss of housetraining
- Difficulty rising, walking or climbing stairs
- Confusion or disorientation
- Persistent cough
- New lumps or bumps
- Bad breath, plaque on teeth, or bleeding gums

- Diarrhoea or vomiting
- Change in sleep patterns
- Ear odours, redness, scratching, or head shaking
- Excessive drinking and/or urination

It is common to assume these signs are a normal part of the aging process; however, these symptoms may indicate underlying agerelated disease.

If you're lucky enough to share your home with an older pet, we recommend having them seen by a Veterinarian at least twice a year. Early detection is key, and fortunately there are many ways we can detect and treat these conditions, and improve the quality of your

In the meantime, here's a few tips so you can help your pet enjoy their golden years:

- · Exercise is important at every stage in your pet's life. However, with senior pets you may need to adjust the frequency and intensity of the exercise. If your pet doesn't use their muscles, they will lose mass, tone, and it will become even harder to move about. Shorter, more frequent walks or swims can help keep your dog in shape and their weight under control.
- If your pet has arthritis or is stiff and sore, giving them access to a ramp to get up and down from higher areas (vehicles or furniture) will make it much easier on their joints, and allow them to maintain some of the adventure they enjoyed as a youngster.
- · Maintain a familiar routine and environment to minimize stress.
- Keep them warm and comfortable. A bed that allows your pet to distribute their weight evenly will reduce pressure on joints and make it easier for them to get out of in the morning.
- Elevate your pet's food and water bowls, particularly if there is stiffness in the neck or back.
- Senior pets generally require fewer calories, less protein and phosphorus. Change to a diet specifically formulated for seniors.
- Keep your pet's teeth clean, by following the home cleaning instructions your vet has given you. Dental disease can cause persistent pain and discomfort, and leads to systemic health problems. Some signs that your pet may be having a dental problem are bad breath, pawing at the mouth or teeth, drooling, difficulty eating and red, irritated, swollen, or bleeding gums.

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# The Cane Barracks Story

In the last century people may have wondered at the small buildings located on a lot of the existing sugar cane farms. A lot of these original structures have been lost to cyclone, flood, fire and time; some have endured, but are completely unrecognisable due to decay and the passing years of their original purpose.

The barracks, as they were commonly referred too, housed itinerant cane-cutters who would come together at the beginning of the season, usually assembled by a recognised leader known as a ganger, on the understanding that the team would stay together for the seven-month season.

The team would consist of eight or nine men, often young single males or older drifters, travelling from cane farm to cane farm cutting the harvest by hand at piece-work rates or for an agreed sum for the overall crop. The success of a full season would depend very much on the organisational ability of the ganger.

When the Moreton Mill commenced crushing in 1897, cane was cut and loaded on to cane trucks on the mill tramline. Local growers cut their own cane, and hauled it to the tramline by horse and slide or horse and dray. The cane was tipped off and reloaded on to the cane trucks. For the first few years, cane was grown within a few miles of the mill, and barracks were not needed for cutters.

As cane growing expanded out to the districts, farmers supplied tents for their cutter's accommodation, several farmers would form a group (this practise was carried on when the barracks became necessary) to get enough cane to employ a gang of six to eight cutters. Each tent would sleep two men. A large tent fly would cover a common dining table. Some farmers built a cooking shed and hot water fireplace with sheets of iron, also a place to bath and shower.

The ganger had to fulfil many functions, be able to bargain with the cane farmers on the team's behalf, ensure that the pay and working conditions were satisfactory and that the barracks supplied were of reasonable standard. He would need to be sure the team was wellfed - a cook usually travelled with them, selected from one of the team, food supplied by the Cane grower.

There were a number of consistent features in the barracks: a cooking recess, a water supply, a wash-house, toilets and waste disposal. Most of these rules were stipulated in the legislation. The buildings were governed by the Workers Accommodation Act 1915-21 which stipulated:

Every building ... shall be constructed of wood, iron, brick, \*pise, cement or other such material as the Minister may approve, and shall be properly provided with light and ventilation to the satisfaction of the inspector.

Floors of sleeping and dining rooms were to be wood, cement, brick, flagstones, tiled, asphalt or other approved by Minister.

The legislation included details about the number of beds in rooms, the bedroom size, ventilation, lighting, the provision of vessels for cooking, eating, drinking and storage. Although barracks vary in style and materials, each can tell the story of how the sugar industry between 1905 and the 1960s relied upon seasonal migrant labourers to manually harvest cane. They are therefore, powerful symbols of a way of life that has made a significant contribution to the evolution of Queensland's community and environment.

The sugar industry in Australia has brought wealth not only to the Nation as a whole, but social stability to many areas of coastal Queensland. Although no record exists of a canecutter strike in the Sunshine Coast area, there was a severe strike in North Queensland in 1935, by the canecutters, which lasted for nine weeks.

A form of plague spread by rats, had appeared in 1933 and continued until 1936, had stricken hundreds of cane cutters working in the cane fields of North Queensland. During 1933-34, 19 cane cutters died, it was called \*Weil's Disease (leptospirosis) spread by infected rats living in and around the cane fields in the undergrowth, an ideal breeding area for the pests.

To settle the strike the growers finally gave in and agreed to go back to burning the cane prior to harvest, although it added to the cost of cutting, burnt cane gave the cutters more protection. Their close connection to each other in the barracks did not help with the

A few years ago, Professor Olavi Koivukangas of the Institute of Migration in Finland began a search for an Australian cane barrack. A lot of Finnish immigrants had made their homes in the barracks during the 1900s, while they worked as cane cutters.

It became a long and complicated process. Mikko, a finnish architect, who at the time, lived in Brisbane, first received a Christmas email from the Professor with the initial request. On the bottom of the email was a PS, "Can you please organise a cane cutters barrack to Finland for the Emigration Museum." At the time he did not know what cane looked like!

Eventually while in Finland for a seminar, he met Reijo Korte a former cane cutter who had lived in Ingham. From there Mikko acted as the liaison between Finland and Australia, while Reijo did the groundwork. When word spread of a search for barrack, a local man, offered the old barrack on his property in Lannercost as a

The project of dismantling a Barrack from Ingham and donating it to the Finnnish Migration Museum was a complicated process. Due to the size of the building and a lot of bureaucracy, it took several years for it to be sent to Finland.

Its new home is in the Finland Migration Museum, fully furnished with the old beds, crockery, stove etc. looking like it did in its heyday, all donated from families of the cutters who had worked here. Almost good enough to consider moving in.

The coast at one time, had its own canecutters barrack that was to be furnished with all the requisite items relating to its use as a memorial to the hardworking canecutters. This was at the Maroochy Wetlands Sanctuary, but the council in its wisdom, has since removed any resemblance to its original design, along with the donated furniture.



This is one of the few (if not the only) barracks still standing on the coast, now used as a storage facility for the farm, it rests in. Could a developer be interested in transporting to a piece of land to preserve this part of our heritage? Finland did.

\*Pise refers to Rammed earth, a building technique often used for flooring.

\*The Weil's disease form of leptospirosis is contracted from the urine of infected rats. The bacteria get into your body through cuts and scratches or through the lining of the mouth, throat and eyes after contact with infected urine or contaminated water.
